Advent, from the Dictionary of the Episcopal Church

"The first season of the church year, beginning with the fourth Sunday before Christmas and continuing through the day before Christmas. The name is derived from a Latin word for "coming." The season is a time of preparation and expectation for the coming celebration of our Lord's nativity, and for the final coming of Christ "in power and glory."

Advent is a time of preparation; getting ready for the holidays; decorating and buying presents; cooking and eating; being with family and friends. It is also a time of preparation for the coming of Jesus in our celebrating of His birth and in our celebration of His final return. That may come a lot later than we think or it may come a lot sooner. We are not to know but consider this, if He were to come right now, would we be ready and would we welcome that news?



There are times when I admittedly would just as soon He not appear at my door. I may be harboring resentment or anger or any number of other things that I would not want to share. Being ready is a constant vigil. It is important to find times to focus on that vigil; times like Lent and even Advent; getting our hearts right; seeking righteousness with God and one another.

Jesus is already here among us and He is also coming; coming to set the world right and we need to be right when He arrives; or at least making an effort in that direction. I hope your Advent can be a time of great joy and fellowship but also a time of reflection and preparation. Thanks be to God.

Thus, joy can be present even in the midst of sadness.

Memories of loved ones who have died rise to the surface, reminding us of their absence during the holidays, and we feel keenly the heaviness of loss. We may be feeling overwhelmed with too many activities, not enough time, or trying to complete an insurmountable list of things to do.

The Blue Christmas service at St. Stephen's will give you an opportunity to slow down and receive some healing in worship with fellow strugglers. Come join us on Sunday, December 15, 2019 at 3 p.m. in St. Stephen's Nave.

Instead of fretting about all you still haven't done, reflect on all the good things life has given you. All are welcome.

CHRISTMAS GIFT AND SHARING BAGS

TURKEY STOCK

After your Thanksgiving dinner, don't throw out your turkey bones! Here's a great way to use the leftovers!

- Turkey carcass
- Water to cover (likely 3 gallons for a single carcass, about 12 liters)
- 2 tbsp Kosher Salt per gallon of water (1/4 cup)
- 1 ½ tsp Pepper per gallon of water (⅓ cup peppercorns)
- 2 Bay leaves per gallon of water (6-7 bay leaves)
- 3-4 carrots
- 3-4 stalks celery

Put everything in a very large pot and bring to a moderate simmer. Simmer until the largest bones are soft or break easily, probably 10 hours or so. Remove bones and filter out any sediment, keeping just the liquid. Use immediately or freeze for later!

From there, you can make turkey soup with rice and vegetables...a healthy and delicious way to incorporate leftovers! See the bottom of page 6 for the recipe!

More often Mary seems to hover in the background emerging from invisibility to significance, as in John's account of the wedding at

TURKEY & RICE SOUP

In a large soup pot, over low heat, sweat the onions with 2 teaspoons of salt in the oil for 15 minutes. Do not let it caramelize. Add the celery and green bell pepper and another teaspoon of salt and sweat the mixture for another 15 minutes. Deglaze the pan with the wine. Raise the temperature to medium.

Add the bay leaves, carrots, pepper and 2 tablespoons of salt. Cook for another 5 minutes. Add the stock. Bring to a simmer over medium high heat. Taste and adjust the seasoning. Add cooked rice, garlic, peas, and turkey. Bring back up to a simmer. Serves approximately 20.



Canola (or vegetable) oil

- 3 gallons Turkey Stock (approximate)
- 3 large Onions, coarsely chopped
- 8 stalks Celery
- 2 green bell peppers (optional)
- 2 cups white wine (Sauvignon blanc or similar)
- 5 Bay Leaves
- 5 Carrots, cubed or sliced
- 4 cups Peas (frozen work best; canned peas do not work)
- 4-8 cups cooked chopped Turkey (optional, as much or as little as desired)
- 2 cups cooked Arborio Rice
- 2 cloves garlic, minced

STEWARDSHIP CAMPAIGN 2020

Results from the stewardship campaign are encouraging so far. More than 80 households, including 10 new, have returned pledge cards. A significant majority of repeat pledging units have elected to increase their pledged amount for 2020. We express our thanks to those who have already responded.
