During the month of June, St. Stephen's will be hosting two seminars to help our parishioners (and any guests you may want to bring) gain more tools on how to effectively manage and plan their financial resources. While we don't like to talk about money, the Scriptures do speak of money frequently. Jesus recognizes it is one of our greatest worries - and hindrances - in our relationship with God and with each other. One of the most common burdens people in any given church face is the stress of money - not having enough, not knowing enough to manage it, not knowing what to do with it after we die.

You are invited to attend either or both of the seminars listed below. The first one on June 1 is geared more towards planned giving during and at the end of life. The second one on June 29 is about learning strategies to manage our money for both present and future needs. Each will take place in the parish hall following the 10:30 service (start time is 12:00 pm). Lunch will be provided.

Our presenter is Joe Ottaviano, CFP, CKA, a well-respected financial planner in Knoxville (his bio is also listed below). 750 Eggs in 3.5 Minutes

Following the dinners, *The Living Compass*, a powerful and popular course, was offered by Emily Doane and Pastor Laura. In addition to the Lectionary Studies, Jamey Kennedy led a Sunday class, Art as Prayer.

We were blessed by so many beautiful musical offerings. The Evensong by the UT Chamber Singers was breathtaking, and we are grateful to Simon Ballintoy for making it possible to have them at St. Stephen's. Our wonderful choir's Fauré Requiem was a gorgeous gift on the evening of Palm Sunday. Our Easter music was powerful, joyful, and inspiring...someone behind me kept saying "WOW!" after every hymn! Jennifer Davis and her crew stuffed and hid 750 eggs...which were all gathered up in 3.5 minutes!



ASCENSION DAY



Ascension Day is a principal feast day of the church. This year, it falls on Thursday, May 29—40 days after Easter. The risen Jesus had been seen by his disciples for those 40 days and then he ascended to his father in heaven in the presence of the disciples.

As Luke described the scene:

"And while they looked steadfastly toward heaven as He went up, behold two men stood by them in white apparel, who also said, 'Men of Galilee, why do you stand gazing up into heaven? This same Jesus, who was taken up from you into heaven, will so come in like manner as you saw Him go into heaven."

Ascension is an ancient feast; it may have been observed as early as 68 AD. In the Orthodox Church, it is one of the Great Feasts. In the Western churches, it was a day when attendance at church was mandatory. In some countries, Ascension is a public holiday.

There are interesting customs, some ancient, that surround Ascension Day. Throughout Europe, during the Middle Ages, Ascension feasts featured birds: swan or peafowl if you were rich enough, or almost anything else that flew. Storks, cranes, quail, partridges, songbirds that could be caught in a net, or chicken, duck, or goose might grace the table. The birds might be roasted or boiled or cooked in a pie. In Germany, pastries were made in the shape of birds.

Why birds? Because Christ "flew" to heaven, of course! For dessert, there was gatnabour. Traditionally, this delicate rice pudding, flavored with rose water and cinnamon, was made from the milk the cows produced on Ascension Day.

Many believed that, when Christ ascended, the sky was blessed, and so all water that falls from the sky on the Ascension is blessed. In some areas, people collected rainwater that fell on Ascension Day, believing that it would heal the sick. But you weren't supposed to do laundry with it!

Work of any sort was thought to be unlucky on this day. In particular, washing clothes was a bad idea – some even said that if you did the laundry on Ascension, someone in the family would die. And just as you couldn't wash clothes, you couldn't make them or mend them: clothing that had been touched by a needle on Ascension was thought to attract lightning.

Apparently, though, fishing doesn't count as work. In some places, Ascension is considered the start of the fishing season. However, in the past, rivers and lakes were considered particularly dangerous on the Ascension: according to old folk beliefs, you were more likely to drown on this day than on any other day.

In central Europe, it was customary to hike, climb mountains, or take picnics on hilltops to celebrate the feast. In Sweden, people would have a gökotta, an early cuckoo morning. They would get up long before sunrise and walk into the forests to hear birds singing at sunrise. A picnic breakfast, singing, and playing music are all part of the festivities. In Portugal, it's traditional to make bouquets of olive branches, wheat, poppies, and daisies on the Ascension. The bouquets are symbols of peace and prosperity.

The Blessing Box May's Loose Offering Recipient

It is hard to believe that soon we will be celebrating the two-year anniversary of the initiation and blessing of our Blessing Box

Most of you are familiar with our Blessing Box, the structure filled with non-perishable food items and toiletries, located at the Vienna Street entrance in the grassy area next to the parking area. In fact, the parish has been wonderful in supporting it through monetary donations and bringing requested food, cleaning, and hygiene items on a weekly basis

The Blessing Box is addressing a real need, being used daily. Recipients can pick up items anonymously and use them free of charge. It provides these items 24/7 to those who may have run out of food, or have been unable to purchase hygiene/cleaning items that are not covered by Food Stamps (SNAP)

We ask the parish to please continue to provide ongoing support in stocking the Blessing Box through in-kind donations of the items requested weekly in the E-News, and/or monetary donations that will be used to purchase needed items. Donated items may be placed in the red wagon located in the Narthex, in the box in the Hospitality Room, or directly in the Blessing Box. If writing a check or donating online, please designate that it is for the Blessing Box.

WOW!

WOW you say? Yes, the Wonderful World of WOW, also known as Walk over Wednesday!

Every Wednesday during the school year St. Stephen's volunteers provide lunch for the high school juniors and seniors who have open campus lunch hour. Four teams of four or five workers are responsible for a week. The Men's Group provides breakfast on the rare fifth Wednesday of a month.

How and why did this ministry develop? The theme of the 2015 Annual Convention was "Who Is Your Neighbor?" Obviously, one of our neighbors is Oak Ridge High School. Deborah Clary was a delegate that year and was the guiding force in our developing the WOW program. A group of interested parishioners visited our neighbors at the Methodist Church to see how they functioned. They provide meals on Thursdays. Other local churches have provided lunch for high schoolers in the past. We chose Wednesday as the best day for us and Walk Over Wednesday (WOW) was born. We started serving lunch the following January.

Cathy Chippendale developed menus for four meals that appeal to teenagers. Volunteers were recruited. Deborah served as chairman for several years. Most of the original cooks have been replaced by new ones and some of the menus tweaked but the very hungry kids keep coming! This year the numbers have ranged from a low in the mid-forties to a high of sixty. The numbers vary depending on what other activities the students may have that day.

New volunteers are always needed and welcome. We find this ministry very rewarding and just plain FUN. Working side-by-side with several of your fellow parishioners once a month is the best way to become friends. Could this be a ministry for you?
