LETTER TO THE PARISH FROM FATHER BAILEY NORMAN

It goes without saying – it is a delight to be back as your Priest-in-Charge! I am excited to reconnect with you – and meet the amazing number of newcomers we have had during my time away!

Sara, James Henry, and I have all missed you tremendously. We look forward to rejoining the amazing ministry and Spirit-filled work you have undertaken under the leadership of Fr. Ashton Sims, Fr. Charles Fels, Fr. Howard Hess, and your Wardens and Vestry while we have been away.

This process of returning has been, by nature, very slow and deliberate.

The Bishop's office, your Vestry, and I wanted to make sure that all of my medical reports were sound to ensure that I was coming back without any significant constraints. Because of my long absence and to make sure I ease back into my work with you, I will be starting at 25 hours per week.

What this means is that, for the first couple of weeks, I will be working Sundays, Mondays, and Tuesdays. I will gradually add a few hours each week until, by the end of May, I should be back to full-time status. Even when I am back full-time, I will remain very careful to maintain good boundaries on my time and energy commitments

as I continue my recovery.

I will preach this upcoming Sunday, April 23, and I hope you can be present on Sunday, April 30, after the 10:00 AM service for a luncheon hosted by the Vestry in which I will share a little about my journey over the past seven months. In addition, I want to hear from you what you've been up to in my absence and continue what I hope to be an ongoing conversation about our shared vision and dreams for St. Stephen's.

I am SO looking forward to seeing all of your faces over the next few weeks.

the polarization that feeds political conflict and violence. Teens will arrive June 28 and leave July 21.

WHY NO CONFESSION DURING EASTERTIDE?

It always strikes some people at St. Stephen's that, during the Easter season, something is missing in our liturgy! For the 50 days of Easter, the corporate rite of confession is not said in our liturgy. Does this mean that we stop sinning or receive a "get-out-of-sin-free" card during Easter?

Of course not! It simply communicates that, in the risen Lord, all of our sins are forgiven and put away. It is a stark and powerful reminder that God's grace in and through Christ is more than enough for us to receive forgiveness and renewal of life.

But because it is not in our Sunday liturgy, it gives more impetus during these 50 days to find the opportunities to say the confession in our own prayers outside of Sunday. I would encourage you to say it in your individual or family prayers at home. We will keep saying the confession in our 11:30 healing service and Eucharist every Tuesday because confession is a significant part of opening ourselves to receiving God's power of healing.

Even on Sunday mornings, you are encouraged to say the confession privately before worship or be more intentional in preparing yourself for worship when you arrive at church (the short prayers beginning on p. 833 in the BCP are excellent for centering oneself before/after worship and communion).

The subtle changes in our corporate liturgy are also invitations to change or renew our daily prayer habits. My hope is that we always pay attention to these changes and see them as ways for us to renew our listening ears for the myriad actions in which God displays the vastness of the divine love for us.
